



MUS ADMISSIONS STANDARDS (4-YEAR CAMPUSES IN MONTANA)



College Prep Curriculum:

- 4 years of English
- 3 years of Math
- 2 years of Lab Sciences
- 3 Years of Social Studies
- 2 Years of College-Prep Electives (foreign language, computer science, visual and performing arts, or vocational units)
 - * Out of state schools will have different requirements. 2 years of a consecutive foreign language is required by many out-of-state schools, but not required for in-state.

ADVANCED PLACEMENT (AP)

- AP courses reflect what is taught in introductory college courses
- Students take the optional AP Exam in May to measure their mastery of college-level work
- Some courses offer both AP and/or dual credit opportunities
- AP Exams have been ordered for current classes, but students may still add an exam with a late fee until 3/1.
 - \$50 exam fee (thanks to a grant!) plus \$40 late fee made in Revtrak
 - Exams take place between May 6-17th.

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PROS & CONS OF DUAL CREDIT

PROS

- Earn H.S. Credit and College Credit at the same time
- College level rigor
- Helps students find right career path
- Helps expedite college degree completion
- Cost effectiveness about 1/3 of the cost,
 may help save thousands (1-2-Free Initiative)
- Lowers remediation rates
- Free tutoring services at Helena College

CONS

- Registration process semesters don't match up
- Transferability of credits
- Rigor of courses
- Grades become permanent records on college transcripts

WHAT ARE COLLEGE ENTRANCE EXAMS?

Entrance exams have historically been required by 4-year colleges and universities

Entrance exams are also used for advising, course placement, scholarship programs, and to identify needs for remedial courses

ACT & SAT are college entrance exams that are **both accepted equally**:

- ACT (HSD tests all juniors in the Spring, recommend a retake in senior year)
- **SAT** (Students may register for and take this exam their junior and/or senior years)

WHAT IS THE PSAT?



PSAT (or Preliminary SAT) is recommended for all college-bound juniors. The PSAT is a great primer for the SAT and ACT.

- The exam is only given once a year in October. Registration will start in May.
- The PSAT won't count towards your college admissions applications, but it is the qualifying test for the National Merit Scholarship

Why take the PSAT?

- To practice for the ACT and SAT
- To receive feedback on strengths/weaknesses on skills necessary for college
- To see how your performance compares with that of others
- To enter the competition for scholarships from National Merit Scholarship Corp (Juniors only)
- To become familiar with the kinds of questions you will see on an actual college entrance exam

PREPARE THROUGH COURSE SELECTION

Research has shown that taking certain courses in high school substantially increases students' readiness for college level work.

- Students with >3 years of science average an 18.2 ACT score
- Student who took earth science, biology and **chemistry** average an 21.3 ACT score

Your student is strongly encouraged to take a science class their junior year, and math all 4 years.

 AP, Honors level, and dual credit courses best prepare students for success on entrance exams and college-level work

Remember: A's in "easy" courses are not necessarily better than B's in more advanced courses in terms of their impact on ACT/SAT scores.


Clearinghouse required for all collegiate athletes

Apply during Junior Year Requirements beneficial to know when registering Make sure to let your counselor know that you are interested!

NCAA REQUIREMENTS

Division I athletes must have a 2.3 GPA in 16 NCAA-approved core courses.

Division II athletes must have a core course 2.2 GPA in 16 NCAA-approved core courses.
