- Gates of the Mountain on Holter Lake with recreation areas is a fabulous place to start. There are guided boat tours (2 hours in length), but don't forget, there are 'on your own' ways to experience the unique geography of this place. Fishing, boating, kayaking, viewing, and camping to name a few dominate this location and bring people together all over Montana to experience. Several highlights of the journey are pictographs left by indigenous peoples (still visible from the water) AND a powerful memorial remembering those that lost their lives in the Mann Gulch fire, from 1949. There are additional offshoots, camp-sites, pavilions, and additional amenities that can make this for days' worth of visits with family and friends.

- Ghost Town's near Helena are in Elkhorn, Comet, Rimini, and Marysville. While Montana has a rich history with preservation of these once thriving towns, much has remained intact that take you back in history. Be mindful when visiting as there are still people living in and around many of these spaces. Even though several are considered 'state parks,' it is always a good reminder to be on the lookout for signage and private property to respect those that populate these towns.

It is important as always with our love for the outdoors that we are mindful of where we are at, not imposing on private land or areas that require permits, and NOT panning in National or State Parks. Read up on permissions if have an inkling to try your hand at this practice to make sure you are protected, as well as our landscape. It is a great activity for everyone to enjoy.
